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Aims & Objectives



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Cogglesford Watermill

The Watermill reopened on Friday 19 November after almost a year of being closed to the public. Behind the scenes though, lots of exciting things have been happening...

The wheel at Cogglesford Watermill can now be powered by the River Slea once more following £30,500 of repair works, which have been funded by North Kesteven District Council.

Up until the site closed for repairs

at the end of 2020 the site's stones ground their own flour using an electric motor after issues with the wheel were identified and the decision was taken to cease use.

The works have seen the waterwheel carefully repaired and restored by local firm RH Displays and Exhibitions, safeguarding it for future generations to see and enjoy as part of the site's authentic milling experience.

Meanwhile a further £20,500 from the Council has funded an



improved experience for visitors to Cogglesford Watermill, including new information boards and other improvements to protect and explain other features where appropriate.

To keep the waterwheel in



tip-top shape, the millers at Cogglesford will be turning the wheel weekly, keeping moisture in the wood and preventing further



damage; the weekly turning schedules will be posted on the Cogglesford website and social media channels.

RH Displays have also utilised the parts of the wheel they couldn't reuse, building some beautiful and unique furniture for the retail space. Cogglesford's shop will be the perfect place to drop in for gifts and local food items, including honey, preserves, plum bread and the mill's own stone-ground flour. Visitors are also welcome to



enjoy the lovely historic setting with a drink and snack alongside the relaxing babble of the River Slea.

With a fantastic new children's area on the first floor, a visit to

Cogglesford Watermill is an experience the whole family will enjoy.

There are some fantastic volunteer opportunities at Cogglesford Watermill – if you have time to learn a new skill (or share your existing ones) then please get in touch. In particular, we're on the



lookout for some gardening enthusiasts to keep the front of the mill looking beautiful and ensuring the area does the wonderful riverside walk justice.

Witham Slea Blue Green Corridor

After the business items at the AGM in September, those present were pleased to hear from Cllr Mervyn Head who gave an update on the Blue Green Corridor. Since then Cllr Head has kindly provided this statement for wider distribution:

We are truly fortunate in North Kesteven to live in a District packed full of natural wonder. There are nature parks and habitats, country walks under vast skies, pockets of woodland and wilderness and coursing through the landscape, the rivers Witham and Slea and



the life which occupies their riverbanks daily. It is all ready for you to enjoy, to step out and breathe the fresh air, hear the rush of water, feel the earth beneath your feet and ground yourself in such beauty. These places are vital for the survival of our native species, such as kingfishers, woodpeckers, fish and eels, otters and even water voles. Green spaces and river corridors have a crucial role to play in theirs and the survival of many others. Increasingly also, as we seek refuge from the strain of the Coronavirus pandemic, nature is the lifeline humans cannot do without either.



Access to nature is the key to better physical and mental health. We know too, in our District of flourishing communities, that access to green space impacts positively on the economy and the health of our towns and villages as people seek out green areas in which to live. This is why we are excited to be working together as a partner in the Witham/Slea Blue-Green Corridor Project, a vision which rooted before the Coronavirus pandemic began. Together with South Kesteven District Council, the Environment Agency, vital support from the European Regional Development Fund, and co-operation with additional key partners, the Witham/Slea Blue-Green Corridor Project and co-operation with additional key partners, the Witham/Slea Blue-Green Corridor Project encompasses a number of improvements and investments.

In our District there are four projects which will be taking place along the River Slea in Sleaford, from Cogglesford Mill Bridge to the A15. These will improve the channel of the river, enhance and create new habitats while improving access for people through to Sleaford. The River Slea as it winds through the town supports much wildlife but is constrained by its brick-lined banks. This work will use bank softening techniques and in-channel enhancements to draw new life to its waters and increase the habitat for existing species.

Works will also include the enhancement of Lollycocks field in Sleaford, an open space near the town centre where greenery meets water and reeds bend in the breeze. Actions will include the creation and improvement of a wetland area there, along with the refurbishment of platforms to the fishing lake. The planting of native species such as Marsh Marigold will combat erosion along the pond. Other developments could include guides and signage to facilitate learning about the site's ecology. There will also be improvements to the current footpath to widen and stabilise it for easier access and use. The projects identified in our District are improvements for both nature and people, and we will welcome any opportunities for communities to take part as they occur.

With our residents and natural spaces in mind, our Council was the first local authority in Lincolnshire to announce a climate emergency, doing so in 2019. Since then, we have shaped a Climate Emergency Strategy and Action Plan and set a target for the District to become carbon neutral by 2030.

Thanks again to Sleaford REP Community Power Fund for the funding to acquire the additional equipment to make this possible.



Getting the word out

Following a gap of a couple of years caused by Covid-19, I have started giving talks again on the heritage and importance of the navigation.

It was third time lucky for a visit to Leasingham WI on November 18th. Unfortunately, it wasn't entirely lucky though! In preparation for the talk, I re-activated the laptop which had been dormant for quite a while. The version of Windows needed to be updated and this took some time to be achieved. The presentation too was out of date and new information and photos needed to be incorporated. All sorted, I arrived at Leasingham, set up the equipment etc. but the presentation failed to load no matter what I did!

Fortunately, I knew the material pretty well and the ladies of the WI were an understanding audience. I gave the talk and explained that, under normal circumstances, I would show some pretty pictures to illustrate the points I made. They expressed appreciation at the end of the talk, it may have been pity but thanks anyway!

A short time later I visited William Alvey School in Sleaford together with Gail Talton from the Lincolnshire Rivers Trust. I had made absolutely sure the technology was all fully functioning this time!

We were giving a presentation to 120 Year 6 pupils and I was concentrating on the history of the navigation and its importance to Sleaford. Gail was looking at the way the river was fed by the aquifer together with the ecological issues involved.

The pupils were very attentive and asked some pertinent questions. Apparently this section of the curriculum will be repeated next year and we were asked if we could contribute again then. In discussion with the member of staff after the presentation, the idea of additional co-operation with the school was raised and this idea will be taken further next year.

Sleaford Festival (provisional name) Spring 2022

At the end of November the Hub and artsNK put on an open evening to get ideas for a fairly short-notice event to be held in town next Spring.

It's to be funded as part of the post-Covid recovery grant awarded by the Government to NKDC and as such it has to be spent and accounted for by 31st March - we do love a challenge!

Because it's essentially funding from the EU moneypot, there are restrictions as well as the deadline, such as not being able to be used for capital expenditure nor as grants to individuals or individual businesses. It does lend itself though to an event including things like performances, lights, heritage and arts activities, which should encourage residents and visitors into the town, whilst bringing the community together, possibly with preevent workshops to prepare for the main event.

Over 50 people attended the first meeting and, looking round the room, the cumulative years of experience in organising events in Sleaford over the last 30 years was immense and ideas flowed think and fast.

Anyway, to cut a long story short at this stage, SNT was represented and we are pleased to say that the river featured quite highly on the list of suitable locations through the town and there was lots of talk of how it could be used, say for trail boats (looking for offers, anyone out there with a suitable boat?), canoes, environmental workshops, etc., which will all be good for raising the profile of the river and our ambitions.

Further meetings and working groups are being planned to develop the ideas within the relatively short timescales and by the time of our next newsletter we will be able to report on how it all went.

The provisional date for the event is around the weekend of 19th March 2022 but it's not yet been decided whether it will be an

afternoon, a day, an evening, a weekend or a week.

Nor has the name of the event been decided; Sleaford Festival is just a working title.

Social Media will be key to finding out more and the marketing teams of Lincs Inspire Ltd (parent company of the Hub and artsNK), and NKDC will be at full action stations between now and the event, so look out for updates on websites, twitter, instagram, tiktok, etc.

As SNT, we will also be sharing info through twitter (@SeafordNavigationTrust), facebook and our website so that the news will reach everyone possible.

We also hope that the event is able to bring the community together for an entertaining, inspiring, sustainable and safe event and, needless to say, we look forward to seeing you there.


