#### Aims & Objectives



#### Minutes of the last AGM:

The minutes were approved as a true record, proposed by Debbie Scott, seconded by Becky Franks.

#### **Directors' Report:**

It was recorded that the report had been circulated. Chris Hayes

summarised the contents and noted it as being the twenty-fifth annual report.

Its reception was proposed by Malcolm Phillips, seconded by Gavin Scott.

Thanks were extended to all committee members, members and volunteers for the work that they carried out on behalf of the Trust.

#### **Accounts and Auditors' Report:**

The accounts and report were presented to the meeting. Their reception was proposed by Malcolm Phillips, seconded by Mel Sowerby.

The appointment of Amanda Jay of Sleaford as the Company's Auditor and the authorisation of the Directors to fix her remuneration was proposed by Becky Franks, seconded by Steve Hayes. Gavin & Debbie Scott declared an interest and abstained.

#### **Election of Directors:**

The following Directors stood for re-election, Mel Sowerby, Dave Carnell and Pat Taylor.

Proposed by Chris Hayes, seconded by Debbie Scott, all were duly elected. Dave Pullen clarified that, at the last AGM, he had meant to say that it was his intention to stand down as a Director of the Trust at the next AGM but to continue as Hon Engineer. Chris Hayes thanked him for all he had done for the Trust in that role. She also thanked Pat Taylor for all her work regarding sales in support of the Trust.

#### **Any Other Business:**

Chris Hayes reported on the activities of the Trust so far in 2022

Committee meetings had continued to be held via Zoom and work parties had taken place at a variety of venues. Volunteers had also undertaken excavator and dumper training. Steve Hayes had met with David Hutchinson of the Environment Agency at the winding hole in South Kyme where David had approved the work done.

Following an approach from Grantham Angling Association Flyfishing Section, the Trust had agreed to lease to them the fishing rights from Cogglesford Lock to Bone Mill Lock on a trial basis. As part of this, GAAFFS will monitor the top pound where fishing is prohibited and where signs to that effect have been posted.

The Trust has continued to work with NKDC on plans for Haverholme by-wash and lock. Permissions have now been received from Haverholme Estates for access and work on the site.

The Trust took part in the very successful RiverLight Festival in Sleaford in March.

The South Kyme Working Group continued to meet and an informal boat gathering was held in the village in May. The visitor moorings there continued to attract an increased number of boats.

Representatives attended the Waterways Restoration Conference in Stroud and the CRT East Midlands Annual Meeting in Leicester. At both events the relevance of Bio-Diversity Net Gain and Well-Being to future funding applications for restoration, particularly through the Shared Prosperity Fund, was confirmed.

This is the twenty-sixth annual report of the Directors of the Trust and covers the year to 31<sup>st</sup> December, 2022. The company was incorporated on 19th December,1996 and its full name is the Sleaford Navigation Trust. A company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales No. 03294818, the Trust is also a registered charity No. 1060234. The governing documents of the Trust are the memorandum and articles of association which have been approved by the Charity Commission.

#### **Objectives, Organisation and Activities**

The Company was established to stimulate public interest in and appreciation of the history, structure and beauty of the waterway known as the Sleaford Navigation or Kyme Eau and to promote the restoration and preservation of the waterway for navigation and other purposes.

#### The Trust

- is organised and controlled by its Directors who provide their services on a volunteer basis as members of the Executive Board which meets monthly, or more frequently if necessary, to formulate and implement strategy and to review progress. There are no paid or seconded staff.
- is a corporate member of the Inland Waterways Association which shares certain objectives with the Trust and provides help and support nationally and locally to all organisations engaged in waterway restoration.
- is a member of the Sleaford Sports Partnership.
- produces its own newsletter which is circulated to members.
- has a website www.sleafordnavigation.co.uk and a Facebook page.
- liaises with NKDC Executive Board Councillor Mervyn Head who has specific responsibility for matters concerning the waterway.

#### **Review of Progress and Achievements**

During the year, the Trust has continued the publicity campaign undertaken in previous years. Executive Board meetings continued to be conducted mainly by Zoom. Liaison with other bodies was sometimes through actual meetings but occasionally via Zoom or Teams. With restrictions lifted it became possible to give a talk about the navigation and SNT to Bourne U3A.

The directors were saddened to hear of the death of Martin Chapman, the Founder and first Chairman of the Sleaford Navigation Society and several attended his funeral in September.

#### Representatives of the Trust attended the following:

- A meeting with the Witham Catchment Co-ordinator, David Hutchinson and Darren Randall of the Environment Agency to inspect the completed winding hole and adjacent habitat enhancement in South Kyme.
- A Witham Catchment Partnership meeting in Belton.
- A series of meetings and conversations in connection with proposed work on the weir crest and by-wash at Haverholme Lock in preparation for further work on the lock itself.
   Consultation took place with personnel from NKDC and the Environment Agency.
- A meeting with representatives of NKDC, EA and contractors in connection with the Blue/Green Project habitat improvements in Sleaford.
- Meetings of the South Kyme Working Group consisting of representatives from SNT, SKPC and the EA.
- Meetings of the Slea Flood Resilience Project.
- Meetings with representatives of Grantham Anglers Association Fly-Fishing Section regarding the potential leasing of a section of the river from the Trust for angling.
- NKDC Shared Prosperity Workshops where the river was identified as a major asset to the town and the purchase, fit-out and operation of a trip boat in Sleaford was put forward.as a project for funding.
- The RiverLight Festival in Sleaford together with the additional

water-based activities preceding the main event.

- A meeting with representatives of SKPC, NKPC and the Ramblers Association regarding the obstruction of the footpath alongside the navigation at Ferry Farm.
- The IWA/CRT Waterways Restoration Conference in Stroud.
- The Northern Canals Association meeting on the Derby Canal.
- CRT East Midlands Annual Meeting in Leicester together with Councillor Mervyn Head and Alan Gray of NKDC.
- Heckington Show with a gazebo and display in the Heritage Village.

Trust work parties have continued at a number of locations including Taylors Lock, Haverholme, the winding hole in South Kyme and Sleaford.

Trust members undertook IWA Waterway Recovery Group training in the use of dump-trucks and excavators

The Annual Boat Gathering took place in South Kyme at the end of April and the AGM later in May.

The Trust continued to be part of the NKDC Good Causes Lottery as one of the causes which could be nominated directly by purchasers of Lottery Tickets.

Representatives of the Trust were pleased to meet with Mary Davison in connection with the gift of the Handley Cup to the Trust in 1995 by her mother, Mrs Hill.

#### **Review of Financial Activities and Affairs**

The resources available are considered adequate to enable the Trust to continue its work effectively at this stage of the restoration programme. The Trust's assets are adequate to fulfil all its obligations and there are no commitments which are required to be disclosed in this report or the notes to the accounts. The Trust is registered for VAT.

#### The Handley Cup

You will have noticed in the Directors' report earlier in this newsletter that Chris and Steve met last year with Mrs Davison, daughter of the late Mrs Hill who had kindly returned the Handley Cup to the Navigation Trust in 1995. We have been trawling through the archives and found the following snippets of information.

Extract from Sleaford Navigation Society newsletter January 1978

'When success was obtained for a Sleaford Navigation Act on June 11th, 1792, Benjamin was appointed Treasurer to the new company and, to mark the appreciation for the efforts made by him over the years to bring the waterway into being, on the day of the opening to traffic (May 6th, 1794) he was presented with a solid silver cup inscribed around the base, 'The gift of the Company of Proprietors of the Sleaford Navigation, May 6th, 1794' As far as is known, this cup is today held privately in the Transvaal, Republic of South Africa.'

#### Extract from SNS Newsletter Autumn 1994

'Benjamin Handley, father of the man who is commemorated by the monument in Southgate, Sleaford, was one of the proprietors of the original bank in Sleaford of Peacock, Handley, Kirton & Co. Ltd. This was in the building now occupied by Lloyds in Sleaford. He was one of the driving forces behind the business community as it attempted on several occasions to obtain a navigation act for Sleaford and the district. These attempts, as we know, came to fruition in 1794 with the opening of the waterway. On the day of the opening, Benjamin Handley was presented with a silver cup as a token of gratitude.

The cup disappeared from view for many years, only to re-appear in South Africa with a member of the family, Mrs Graham.

Unfortunately Mrs Graham died earlier this year but her daughter

and son, having brought the cup back to this country have now offered it to the society. We have gladly accepted and are now exploring the possibilities of displaying the cup in the area. We hope to have the cup formally presented to us in January and consider this is a fitting end to our bi-centenary celebrations in 1994'

#### **East Mercia Rivers Trust**

Gail Talton, Witham Project Manager, tells us:

Climate change is felt most powerfully through water, flooding, extreme weather, pollution, and drought. Most of the world will be living with water stress within the next few years. Lincolnshire is known to be the most vulnerable region in the UK to climate change.



Furthermore, from sewage to drought, rivers have been featured much in our national newspapers. With no river classed as good in England we need to double down on efforts to restore and enhance our watercourses. The river Slea is classed as a limestone river, fed by springs, it is an important source of drinking water and, when restored, is home to protected species such as native crayfish, brown trout, and water voles.

East Mercia Rivers Trust (EMRT) is an independent charity formed in September 2022 following the merger of Welland Rivers Trust



and Lincolnshire Rivers Trust (established 2011 and 2013 respectively), operating in the Witham and Welland catchments, which covers over 120 watercourses.

Volunteering and educational programmes run by EMRT have multiple personal benefits, helping people improve health and wellbeing as well as skills and knowledge. Increasingly, through Citizen Science programmes we can collate important data, enabling us to monitor the health of our rivers.



We are currently developing a programme of citizen science to bring together people, knowledge and data.

Empowering local communities to take action and be part of the solution; ensuring rivers thrive in the long run.



Supported by his meticulous research and collaborations with other local historians, he has produced yet another mine of information. Of particular interest to anyone connected with the Navigation will the detail of how the various plots of land changed hands and usage throughout the Navigation's operation from 1794 to 1879, as well as the different


roles taken by the various characters in power in the town during this time
