

DIVING TO ADVENTURE?

An early-spring work party at Taylors Lock revealed a problem resulting from the high volume of water that has been present over the winter months. The guillotine gate at the lock had originally been installed so that it could be used in connection with flood control if necessary and this year the bottom gates had indeed been secured open to allow excess water to pass through the lock. Inevitably the water brought with it a certain amount of silt and it

was initially thought that this was the reason why the bottom gates were failing to close properly. Obviously the lock would not operate until the obstruction was moved.

Initial attempts from a small boat using poles and rakes failed to make any difference, one gate would not close. It was then suggested help was sought and Steve Hayes approached the underwater search capability team for Lincolnshire Police to ask if they would appreciate a training opportunity in the lock! He was delighted to find that they were happy to help and would check out the lock as part of a

training exercise. Their work is generally for missing persons, stolen vehicles and items discarded by suspected criminals from crime scenes but they also search areas to declare them clear for

Royal visits. The team had worked on ensuring the security of sites for the 2012 Olympic events. There are 9 unit members who all work part time on the unit and perform other Police duties as their main role. There are 3 dive supervisors and before diving they needed authority from a dive contractor within Lincolnshire Police

clearly marked, police vehicle excited no small amount of interest and speculation in North Kyme so some residents were assured that no major crime investigation was afoot.

The divers appreciated the explanation of the construction of the lock and the paddle operation before diving and completing a practice finger-tip search.

They quickly identified the cause of the obstruction, a hefty chunk of water-logged tree trunk which had lodged on the bottom cill. This was removed and the gates worked perfectly!

The training exercise continued and both observers were full of praise for the skill shown in the painstaking, systematic search technique completed in the complete darkness of the muddy water.

NORTHERN CANALS ASSOCIATION MEETING IN LINCOLN

The Northern Canals Association is an informal meeting forum for canal restoration societies and trusts located north of Birmingham where they can exchange ideas, share good practice and interact with a variety of relevant speakers. The group meets three times a year and attempts to address current issues of waterway restoration and management.

This year the early-Spring meeting on March 10th was hosted by SNT and held at the new Heritage Skills Centre in Lincoln Castle grounds, see http://www.lincolnshire.gov.uk/visiting/historic-buildings/lincoln-castle/heritage-skills-centre

The day followed a different format from usual in that the afternoon was given over to a presentation by expert David Sleight on the use of lime mortar. This proved to be very informative and the explanation of the inherent properties of heritage structures and the detrimental effect of indiscriminate use of modern building materials in restoration was extremely useful.

The morning session included a presentation by Caroline Killeavy, Head of Community Engagement, Canal & River Trust, on "Fostering & maintaining community engagement". Caroline was instrumental in the establishment of the Lincolnshire Waterways Partnership and is an old friend of the Sleaford Navigation Trust committee. It was interesting to hear how the new charity is addressing the issue of involving new people in the waterways movement and how the endorsement of such high profile companies as Marks & Spencer, through their involvement in corporate volunteering, is enhancing the CRT profile.

This was followed by somewhat of an emergency discussion led by Geraint Coles on the potential effects on canal restoration of the recently announced extension of the HS2 route. Particularly affected is the Chesterfield Canal Trust where the proposed route destroys the line of the canal and cuts through the recently opened Staveley Basin but others too were finding themselves forced to address new potential barriers to restoration. It may well be that the HS2 extension does not materialise but the possibility of its existence can have a devastating effect on potential funders of the waterway projects. The Northern Canals meeting provided an opportunity for delegates to agree a common approach of opposition, not to the HS2 itself but to the current designated route.

The Heritage Skills Centre is a stunning building with wonderful facilities and was much appreciated by those attending the meeting. Claire Butler, the Centre Manager gave us a very warm welcome and the SNT catering team of Penny Carnell, Pat Taylor and Sue Sowerby did us proud with an excellent lunch including Lincolnshire Plum Bread!


MODEL BOATS ON THE SLEA!

SNT was recently approached by a representative of a group of model motor boat enthusiasts to ask about the possibility of using the area near the slipway in Sleaford to sail their craft. Steve and Chris Hayes met with them to look at the area and hear what they wanted to do. It would appear that some of these boats are quite sizeable and there is a real problem in trying to launch them by leaning over the water from the side. Involuntary submersion of the operator can be the result! In some cases though submersion is exactly what is required as the hi-tech models built by the enthusiasts include submarines!

Following discussion in committee and reassurances that there were no pollution issues involved, SNT agreed in principle to the use of the slipway to launch model boats but advised the group to inform Sleaford Town Council of their intentions.

We look forward to seeing more boats, albeit small ones, using the top pound!





BOOK OF THE MONTH

The Cotswold Canals Towpath Guide The Stroudwater Navigation by SNT member Mike Handford

The Stroudwater Navigation was a canal linking Stroud to the Severn Estuary near Gloucester. At Wallbridge near Stroud it connected to the Thames and Severn Canal to form a link between the River Thames and River Severn. It passed through a total of thirteen locks and was eight miles in length. The canal was opened in 1777 and operated until it was formally abandoned in 1954.

In 2001 the Cotswold Canals Partnership was formed to restore the Stroudwater Navigation from Stonehouse to Stroud.

Mike Handford's history of the Stroudwater was first published in the 1970s; this completely revised new edition has been published to reflect the restoration work that has taken place since then. Complete with 100 black and white illustrations many of which are published for the first time this book will bring the restoration story up to date.

HAVE YOU EVER BEEN TO...COGGLESFORD WATERMILL?

This historic watermill is thought to be the only sheriff's' watermill still in operation in the country.

The word sheriff evolved from the words 'shire' and 'reeve'. The Reeve was an agent or official of the Lord of the Manor (or Shire) who collected the payment from local people who were obliged to have their grain ground at Cogglesford (for a fee!)

Cogglesford Watermill, is situated in a picturesque setting on the River Slea, right on the edge of Sleaford.

It helps to form a heritage "triangle" of attractions – the National Centre for Craft and Design and Navigation House, a restored canal office, are both within the same half-mile stretch of the river.

Like Navigation House, it is owned and managed by North Kesteven District Council.

Although the present watermill was probably built around 1750, with the top floor added in the 1840s, millers have produced flour on this site since c 700AD.

The watermill is mentioned in the Domesday Book, and the "Coggle Ford", after which the watermill was named, is a few yards further east, where Mareham Lane, a prehistoric trackway and Roman road, crossed the River Slea.

By 1885, the current watermill had ceased full working and eventually fell into a serious state of neglect. It was rescued from collapse in 1991 by North Kesteven District Council.

The Grade II-listed three-storey watermill has an internal wooden waterwheel and two sets of millstones which visitors can watch in operation on milling and event days.

Organic wholemeal flour is produced just as it would have been 200 years ago, and when milling is not taking place, video footage of the process can still be seen.

Cogglesford Watermill is a member of "Tastes of Lincolnshire" – a Lincolnshire County Council and European Union funded project encouraging people to choose local food and drink – and its organic wholemeal stoneground flour is sold in the watermill shop,

which also features items from local suppliers and producers including honey, jams, chutneys, Lincolnshire lavender, wildflower seeds, gifts and souvenirs.

The mill is in a picturesque position by the side of the river, with a millpond and ducks. It's a pleasant walk from the town centre through Lollycocks Field nature area and the Nettles.

Visitors can discover the fascinating characters and events that shaped the watermill's history, from its Anglo Saxon origins to present day.

The Mill features a programme of special events with children very much in mind and include milling days on the second Sunday of each month from March to December

Some of the events are organised to coincide with larger events in

the town as part of a wider regional or national initiative, such as National Mills Weekend

One of the things that fascinates people is the graffiti in the watermill – some of it dates back to 1663. It was a tradition for millers to carve their names into the old wooden beams and the door frames. Not all of

them are dated but in some cases we have the names of the millers and the dates of the carvings.

When the grain is lifted onto the top floor, it goes through trapdoors – they are the original trapdoors and leather hinges and are over 160 years old. Quite a lot of the original features remain, and others have been sympathetically restored. A traditional millwright comes in each year to maintain the millstones and the milling gear and about six years ago, a major refurbishment took place at the

watermill.

A new timber floor had to be laid on the ground floor; the replacement timber was reclaimed from an old cotton mill outside Leeds.

Cogglesford Watermill, East Road, Sleaford, is open from 1st April to the 31st October, Monday to Friday, noon to 4pm; Saturdays, Sundays and Bank Holiday Mondays, 11am to 4.30pm. From November to March, the watermill opens Saturdays and Sundays only, noon to 4pm.

Admission is free – but for health and safety reasons, children 14 years and under must be accompanied by a responsible adult. Refreshments are available at the adjacent Cogglesford Mill Cottage Restaurant & Coffee Shop. THE SIR JOSEPH BANKS CONNECTION

We are fortunate to welcome Pearl Wheatley from the Sir Joseph Banks Society as the Speaker at our AGM this year.

Joseph Banks is a fascinating figure and no brief description can hope to do him justice. In 1768, he joined an expedition, led by Captain James Cook, to explore the uncharted lands of the South Pacific. The expedition circumnavigated the globe and visited South America, Tahiti, New Zealand, Australia and Java. Banks collected an enormous number of specimens on the way and, on his return, his scientific account of the voyage and its discoveries sparked considerable interest across Europe.

Banks was interested in plants that could be used for practical purposes and be introduced to other countries for possible

commercial use. After he became president of the Royal Society in 1778, he promoted the careers of many scientists and in his capacity as director of the Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew, sent many botanists abroad to find new plants.

It was from a position of considerable influence that Banks was able to assist the passage of the Act of Enablement for the Sleaford Navigation through Parliament in 1792.

In spite of spending a great deal of time at his London house in Soho Square, Banks retained his interest and involvement in Lincolnshire and saw the inauguration of the Sleaford Navigation and the neighbouring Horncastle Canal as instrumental to the economic future of the area. As well as promoting both ventures, he was sufficiently involved to find time to choose their mottoes and design their respective crests. The crest designed by Banks is still used today by Sleaford Navigation Trust.

Sadly he seems to be better known in Australia than in Lincolnshire. There he is commemorated in Botany Bay, in the Banksia tree, in a suburb of Sydney by the same name and in Bankstown and Revesby.

I'm sure we shall find out lots more about him at the AGM in May.
