

Desilting at Taylors Lock

After the heavy rain of the winter 2012 - 2013 a huge amount of silt was washed down the Navigation with a sizeable quantity being deposited in the lock cut below Taylors Lock. This caused a huge problem for boats trying to attend the annual Boat Gathering in South Kyme in 2013 as even shallow drafted craft couldn't negotiate the silt bar. The problem was that the silt wasn't the

normal soft silt that is often encountered on the Navigation but something altogether more substantial that couldn't be pushed through. In fact some craft became so stuck that they had to be

winched off the obstruction.

The Trust negotiated with the **Environment Agency about the** removal of the silt and obtained a D1 Exemption and Land Drainage Consent to facilitate desilting. In parallel with this quotes were sought from contractors and a price for carrying out the work accepted from Phil Wright Excavations of Sutton Bridge.

The Trust was lucky that a suitable excavator was free at the right time Photos: S Hayes

and, in fact, the excavator arrived on site on Tues 11 March and started work on Wed 12.

To facilitate the work the pontoon and walkway were moved on the Wednesday and replaced on the Friday when that section had been desilted.

None of this work could have taken place without very

After a gap of two years, Sleaford Navigation Trust was delighted to be able to hold the annual Boat Gathering in South Kyme over the Early May Bank Holiday weekend. Problems with flood control and a silt bar in the entrance of Taylors Lock had, as you will be aware, resulted in the cancellation of the two previous rallies but this year, thanks to the de-silting undertaken by the Trust (see pages 4-6), fourteen boats were able to take part in the celebrations in South Kyme.



Doug Hamilton-Cox, intrepid walker and fundraiser, arrived in Sleaford on Tuesday 13th May having completed the latest section of his challenging tour of the British internal waterways national network by adding the Sleaford Navigation to the long list of canals that he has walked.

He set off from Chapel Hill at 10.30, to walk along the river bank to South Kyme where he met up with local residents before striding out again towards Sleaford where he arrived at 4.00pm.

Doug explains, 'I am a 70 year old ex soldier who with my wife Sue set out 5 years ago to raise money for our wounded troops via Help for Heroes. We undertook a short 150 mile walk from our home on Dartmoor to Wootten Bassett in Wiltshire. This



was so successful that the following year we repeated the exercise with a 250 mile stroll from home to Selly Oak Hospital in Birmingham, the first port of call for our wounded returning from Afghanistan, again with great success. I had now developed a severe case of itchy feet, so in 2011 decided to do the ultimate and final walk of John O'Groats to Lands End. Mission accomplished but I still couldn't settle. So I am now half way through my Final Challenge of walking all of the 2500 miles of canals in the IJK

Sue and I have raised £82,000 to date and aim to make it £100,000 before we finish.'

Yet more onion roots!

In the last newsletter I wrote about my researches into family history and my discovery that I had boating connections. Further research has meant that I now realise that, completely unknown to me, I am descended from a complex web of boating families. I've had a brief insight into a strongly-linked community where extended families lived next door to one another on land, Foss Bank was home to three such. I have traced the fortunes of individual members of my family but the strict adherence to family Christian names made things a bit difficult, they were all called George, Charles or John!

One George Boothby was at Thorne on the night of the census in 1861, master of the vessel 'Sarah', registered in Lincoln and carrying 50 tons of coal. George was 24 at the time and accompanied by his wife and 2 year old daughter. Ten years and three children later, he was working as a porter in an Oil Cake Warehouse in Lincoln and I was left wondering what had gone wrong with the career as a waterman. I felt a sense of family pride to read in the 1881 census that George, now 44, accompanied by his wife and six children, was master of the vessel 'Mizpah', registered in Hull and carrying 100 tons of general cargo.

Further checking of the census records revealed that when George was working in the warehouse his father-in-law, John Thorpe, had recently died and his mother-in-law was living with them. This proved to be the link to the Horncastle Canal for which I had been looking. John Thorpe had been a waterman too. Twenty years earlier, in 1861, John and Sarah Thorpe were on a vessel named 'Transit', registered in Lincoln, on their way from Lincoln to Horncastle with 70 tons of general cargo. They had picked up the census form at Kirkstead Wharf on the Witham.

On the same night, John and Lucy Boothby, my great, great, great, grandparents, were moored in the Brayford in Lincoln, in a sailing keel named 'Queen', registered in Horncastle, laden with 60 tons of coal, bound for Horncastle.

The quest however goes on. I was astonished to discover that one of the lock keepers living at Kyme Lower Lock (Bottom Lock) on the Slea was a Boothby and that two of his children were born there. I now need to trace if there is a family connection there.
