Objectives, Organisation and Activities

The Company was established to stimulate public interest in and appreciation of the history, structure and beauty of the waterway formerly known as the Sleaford Navigation or Kyme Eau and to promote the restoration and preservation of the waterway for navigation and other purposes.

The Trust

•is organised and controlled by its Directors who provide their services on a volunteer basis as members of the Executive Board which meets monthly, or more frequently if necessary, to formulate and implement strategy and to review progress. There are no paid or seconded staff.

•is a corporate member of the Inland Waterways Association which shares certain objectives with the Trust and provides help and support nationally and locally to all organisations engaged in waterway restoration.

•is a member of the Sleaford Sports Partnership and continues to use their premises for some meetings.

•produces its own newsletter which is circulated to members.

•has a website www.sleafordnavigation.co.uk and a facebook page.

Review of Progress and Achievements

During the year The Trust has continued the publicity campaign undertaken in previous years. Activities have included attendance at a series of events which were successful in raising public awareness of the Navigation and, in some cases, also proved a success in the secondary function of fund-raising. These included Charity Markets at Washingborough, Heckington Show, waterways events at Cogglesford Mill and on the Chesterfield and Grantham Canals. Press releases, articles and interviews resulted in valuable publicity both locally and in the national waterways press. In addition, visual promotional presentations were given by Trust members to a variety of audiences.

Representatives of the Trust attended an Inland Waterways Association/ Canal & River Trust seminar in Birmingham , CRT meetings in Nottingham, Lincoln and Retford, and Northern Canals Association meetings. The Trust is represented on the Witham Catchment Partnership Steering Committee. Directors of the Trust attend meetings of the Sleaford Regeneration Group. Working in partnership with the Environment Agency, the silt bar below Taylors Lock, which had prevented boats from navigating beyond, was removed by contractors in April who desilted about 100M of river below the lock. The traditional boat-gathering at South Kyme could therefore take place and was graced with the presence of the Bishop of Lincoln.

The Trust has continued to work with South Kyme Parish Council to establish a Water Access Point in South Kyme. The Parish Council have now acquired the ownership of the necessary land and the Trust is looking to the funding applications and consents required before work can commence.

Representatives of SNT have attended meetings with the Environment Agency and the Parish Council, separately and together, to discuss waterway related issues.

Trust work parties have continued at a number of locations including Taylors Lock, Haverholme Lock and Sleaford.

Review of Financial Activities and Affairs

The Trust has been fortunate enough to receive monies from individual donors and raised capital from the sale of goods. The resources available are considered adequate to enable the Trust to continue its work effectively at this stage of the restoration programme. The Trust's assets are adequate to fulfil all its obligations and there are no commitments which are required to be disclosed in this report or the notes to the accounts.

Winding Hole in South Kyme

It had been the Trust's firm intention to have the winding hole in South Kyme in place prior to the May Boat Gathering this year but, unfortunately, things have not gone as planned.

Funds were being put in place, thanks to Trust efforts and a generous donor, with an additional grant awarded by Inland Waterways Association's Restoration Committee. Preliminary discussions over Land Drainage Consent had been completed with the Environment Agency and a slot reserved with the contractor, when problems surfaced. There had been some ambiguity about the need for planning permission as no structure was being erected but further enquiries regarding clarification resulted in a planning application being deemed necessary. This was not seen as something that would call a halt to the project but it did put pressure on the timescale. More significant was the result of the Ecological Survey which had to be completed before the Land Drainage Consent could be given. Here the results indicated that the presence of different species of wild life could not be ruled out and that it would not therefore be possible to complete the work before May.

Consequently, sadly, the work will be delayed and will now be undertaken in the Autumn when the impact on wildlife will be greatly reduced.

Work Party News.

January's work party was held at Chapel Hill to erect the information board on the grass near the moored boats. Guy Foreman was on hand to help decide the best location and it was all done very quickly.

This will be an ongoing project over the coming months.

March again was in Sleaford to finish some work started in December and the digger was very useful to clear most of the reeds that were reducing the flow of water in this section down to Cogglesford Mill.An area of the bank was strimmed on both sides of the river in partnership with the Sleaford clean up group.

A new funding stream?

Historic records show that the monks of Haverholme found the mud from the Slea to have curative properties and used it for poultices. In recent years this quality has gone unrecognised but now that is changing. Modern methods of purification have meant that harmful afropillo bacteria can be removed and the refined mud used as a beauty aid to both the body and face.

The well-known entrepreneur Rolo Lipaf is now considering adding to his considerable chain of spas by building a new complex near Cobblers Lock where visitors will be able to experience the exhilarating effect of Slea mud baths. He has already made a preliminary visit to the site

today, April 1st. (Dave Pullen says the experience can be had at no cost by coming on a work party - but that's another story!) We are hoping this will bring considerable financial benefits to the Trust.

NB The secret purification process is essential. Do not attempt to apply the mud or silt unless it has been processed.

Water Access Point in South Kyme

A decision was made by the directors that the immediate focus for attention should be the winding hole in South Kyme which has meant that the Water Access Point has had to take a backseat for the moment. A contributing factor to this decision was that the WREN funding which we had hoped to secure towards the project was no longer available. Waste Recycling Environmental (WREN) funding is only available for suitable projects within ten miles of a landfill site. The local site has now closed and the only NKDC landfill site left is in North Hykeham. Some funding is already in place for the project but I am delighted to be able to say that South Kyme Parish Council have made a very generous contribution of £1500 to the completion of the Water Access Point. We are extremely grateful for their support.

We have always enjoyed a warm relationship with the village and look forward to our yearly boat gathering. Our recent working group meetings with the Parish Council and the Environment Agency have been very productive and we hope to be able to progress the Water Access before too long.

Sleaford Urban Opportunities Study update.

Since the last newsletter, a firm of consultants, Clear Environmental of Derby, have been engaged to deliver the Sleaford Urban Opportunities Study and a series of meetings of stakeholders have been held. Several suggestions have been put forward and, following a selection process, funding will be sought by the Lincolnshire Rivers Trust to take these further.

Some of the suggested developments are to the West of Sleaford and include a proposed wet woodland area which could act as a reservoir to retain water and a haven for wildlife. This could be an area for public access and be a different kind of leisure opportunity for Sleaford.

Among other suggestions was a soft engineering solution to the problem of bank erosion in the area near the lift bridge and slipway in Sleaford. Coir rolls would provide the opportunity for natural vegetation to become established and backfilling would help stabilise the banks and tree roots. It may be that some of this project could be delivered through volunteer

participation but the schemes have not yet reached a development stage and funding will have to be sourced. Nevertheless, this idea is one that the Trust are happy to endorse.

Dr. Lauren Tewson, Director of the Lincolnshire Rivers Trust, has kindly agreed to speak at the AGM in May so hopefully will be able to give us more information then.



News from the House 1774 - a Navigation for Sleaford

We are accustomed to seeing the workings of parliamentary committees on television but an examination of the 1774 Hansard gives us an insight into the first attempt before Parliament to make the River Slea navigable. Initially this was in the form of a petition to Parliament for permission to present a Bill to the House.

On 28th February 1774 it was recorded that "A Petition of several Gentlemen, Clergy, Freeholders, Merchants, Farmers, Tradesmen, and other Inhabitants, in the County of Lincolnshire was presented to the House". It was intended that the river would be made navigable from "Sleaford Castle Causeway, through the Market Town of New Sleaford, in the County of Lincoln, to the River Witham, near a place called Chapel Hill".

Interestingly the petition also suggested that there were branches of the river that could also be capable of being made navigable although, unfortunately, these branches are not detailed. It was said that the river would be made navigable for boats, barges and other vessels and that this would be "of great Benefit and Advantage to the Petitioners and other inhabitants of the said County, and of public Utility".

There was at least one local MP on the committee, Lord Brownlow of Grantham, who reported back to the House on 28^{th} March that they had summoned the Engineer James Creassy to confirm the details of the petition. It was reported that he had confirmed that the Navigation would be 12 miles long of which $2^{1}/_{2}$ miles were already navigable.

The following question and answer session gives a modern reader a curious sense of listening in to that exchange of so many years ago.

"What will be the Expense of making the River capable of carrying Vessels of 20 Tons Burthen?"

"It will cost about £6,000."

"Is the River capable of being made navigable?" "It is."

He was asked, "Whether the adjoining Lands will be injured by its being made navigable?"

"By the necessary scouring and deepening the River, and forming the earth arising into Banks, it will render the adjoining lands much more secure from Floods, which now frequently happen there and do great damage." The committee asked, "Whether the Mills will receive any Damage?" "He presumed not; that they are not to be meddled with, and only the waste water taken for the Purposes of the Navigation; that the course of the Mill Streams is to be deserted and the Old River followed".

On being asked ,"Whether the course of the Old River is to be deserted anywhere?" he replied "Yes, in Two Places; one near Sleaford, in order to avoid several little Turns in the River; the other a little above Flax Dike, for the Purpose of avoiding the Mill Stream".

"What Advantages will accrue to the Public from the carrying of the above Scheme into Execution?"

Creassy replied "It will furnish an easy and cheap Conveyance for the Produce of the Country, and the Returns of Coal and other heavy Commodities, and will also open a Communication with Boston and Lincoln, and from thence into the River Trent".

They asked "Whether he had made any Calculation of the Sum likely to arise by the Tonnage on the River?"

"That if laid at One Shilling per Ton, he is of Opinion the Amount will be about £500 a Year".

The committee called Mr Robert Banks to confirm that the evidence with respect to the practicality of the scheme and to the sum likely to be raised by tolls. Mr Banks also confirmed that the money needed to fund the Navigation would be easily raised at *"legal interest"*.

The committee ordered that leave be given to present a Bill to Parliament for the Slea to be made navigable and that Lord Brownlow, Mr Amcotts, and Sir Cecil Wray should prepare the Bill. Accordingly on 15th April 1774 the Bill was presented to Parliament and received a successful first reading with the House resolving to give the Bill a second reading.

History records that the Creassy scheme eventually foundered due to the objections of farmers on the lower part of the Slea who were concerned about the effect of the navigation on land drainage. This led, eventually, to the Jessop plans being adopted in the 1792 Act and the founding of the present Navigation.
